What do I do once I get there?

Parking:

The west side of Parking Lot 13 M (see the map on page four) has been assigned to SUMA Summer School attendees. Watch for signs that say “SUMA” to mark the designated area. You can park in these rows for the duration of the workshop, even if you aren’t using campus accommodations.

The Kisik Towers are only a short walk from the parking lot; head there for registration. Watch for arrows marked on the sidewalk in chalk for directions from the parking lot to the residence.

Registration:

You can register from 4:00 p.m. – 5:00 p.m. on Sunday in the atrium of Kisik Towers (refer to the map on page four). SUMA staff will be there to register you for SUMA Summer School, and get you checked into your room if you are staying on campus. If you can’t make it to registration Sunday afternoon, you can also register during the Welcome Dinner Sunday evening or before class Monday morning.

What is the scoop on accommodations?

If you’re staying right on campus at the University of Regina, welcome to Kisik Towers. Each private room consists of a bed, desk, and washroom. There will be bedding on the beds and towels in the bathrooms, just as there would be at a hotel. There will be hotel-sized soaps and shampoos in the tub/shower, but no hair dryers. You also have access to a common area on the main floor of the residence with a small shared kitchen — including a fridge and a microwave — couches, and two televisions.

The residence is air conditioned during the summer months, so you might want to bring an extra blanket or quilt with you — it can get chilly in the rooms when it is cool outside.

Where is the classroom?

The main classroom is RI 119, in the Research and Innovation Centre (RIC) (see the map on page four). The concurrent session on Monday afternoon, Media Training 101, will be in RI 208, on the second floor of the RIC. Watch for signage directing you to this room.

What about the food?

All meals are included in your registration cost, with the exclusion of Monday evening. Monday evening is your time to check out local restaurants or stay in to recharge for Tuesday.

Vending machines are available, and a Tim Hortons is close by on campus for refreshments during workshop breaks. Food and drink are not permitted in the Education Auditorium.

Sunday:

The Welcome Dinner with Special Guests will be hosted in the Cambridge Room at the Travelodge Hotel (4177 Albert Street). If you don't want to drive, a bus will be leaving from outside Kisik Towers at 5:15 p.m. This is a great option if you'd like to have drinks with dinner.

The Welcome Dinner is a chance to enjoy a delicious meal and get to know your fellow classmates.

Monday:

Breakfast will be served in the RIC Atrium just outside of RI 119 (see the map on page four) at 7:30 a.m. and is open to all attendees, even if you didn't stay on campus. Watch for signage to guide you in the right direction from the parking lot and onsite residence.

Lunch will be served in the RIC Atrium just outside of RI 119 following the Open Forum on Council Operations session.

The afternoon will wrap up at around 4:30 p.m. and you will have the rest of the evening for yourself – see the city, recharge for tomorrow's classes – the choice is yours.

Tuesday:

Breakfast will be served in the RIC Atrium just outside of RI 119 (see the map on page four) at 7:30 a.m. and is open to all attendees. Watch for signage to guide you in the right direction from the parking lot and onsite residence.

Lunch will be served in the RIC Atrium just outside of RI 119 following the CAO Performance Evaluation Toolkit session.

There is Wi-Fi internet available on campus. Log on to UofRGuest and you will be connected. In the residence there is also an Ethernet connection if you want to bring the applicable cord to plug in with.

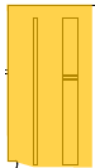
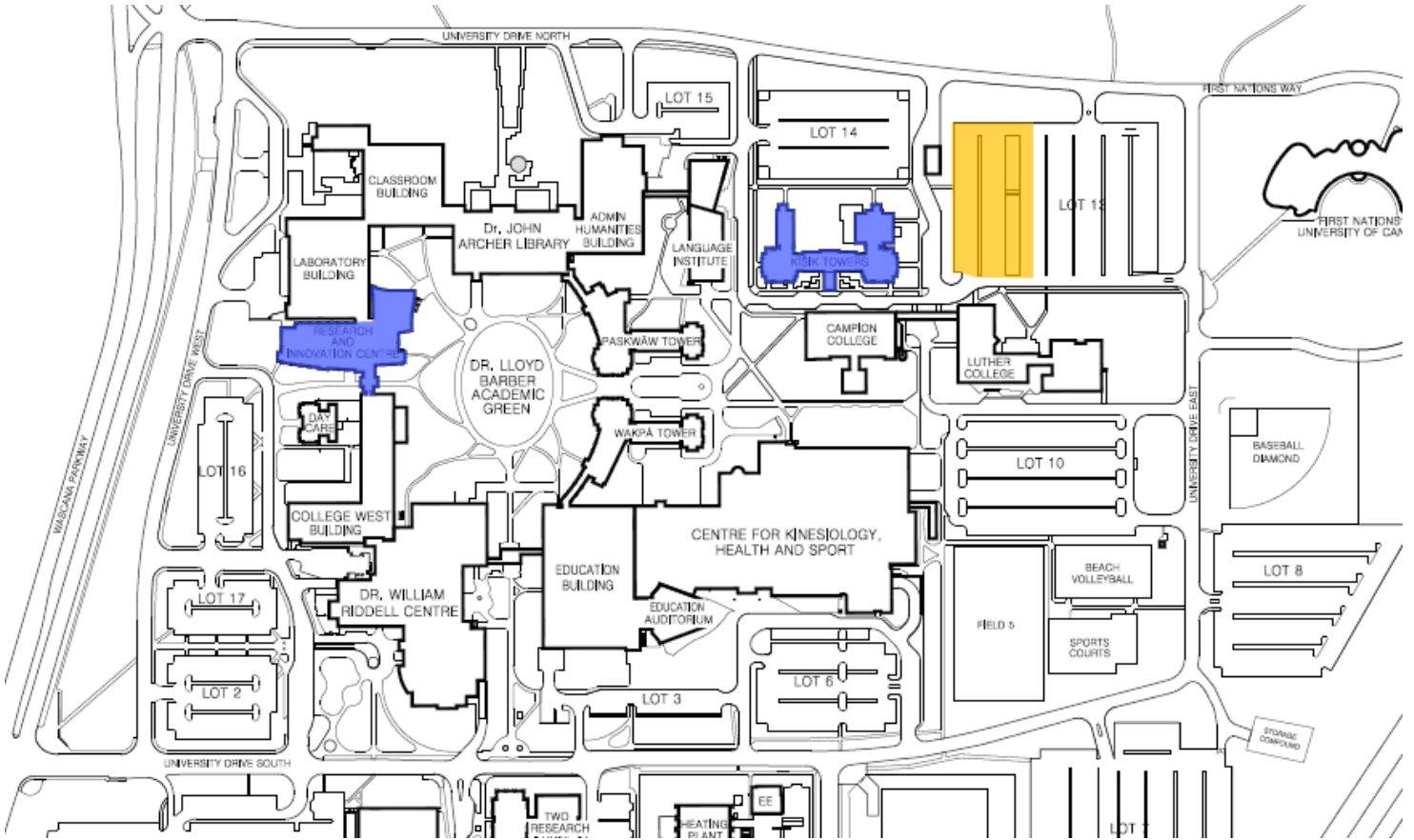

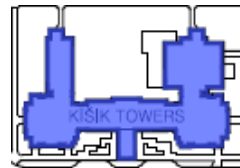
