## Advocacy Update

### Minister of Environment and SK Recycles Responds to EPR Questions

Earlier this year, SUMA formally reached out to **SK Recycles** to address the ongoing challenges with the **Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) implementation** and seek clarity on behalf of our members. We submitted a comprehensive list of the issues members raised, alongside the specific actions we expect to see to ensure this system works for all municipalities. These concerns were outlined in our [What We Heard](#) document.

We are currently working on our next steps and will continue to provide updates.

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## SUMA's Submission to Federal Sustainable Development Strategy

Last week SUMA submitted a letter in response to Environment and Climate Change Canada's public consultation on the **Draft 2026-2029 Federal Sustainable Development Strategy (FSDS)**.

This submission responds to the three pillars of the Draft Strategy: *Building an Inclusive and Resilient Society*, *Driving Sustainable Growth*, and *Protecting Our Environment and Well-Being*.

Our submission urges the federal government to work with Saskatchewan's urban municipalities as key partners in sustainable development. We call for more direct, predictable, and flexible funding, especially for infrastructure, water, climate resilience, reconciliation, and community well-being. We stress that federal strategies must reflect local realities, with flexible policies and higher federal cost-sharing for smaller and northern communities; integrated project streams; and dedicated support for water and wastewater, climate adaptation, and emergency response. We advocate for the role of municipalities in reconciliation, newcomer settlement, mental health, and digital connectivity to be recognized and funded. We also are requesting a permanent municipal advisory table to ensure ongoing consultation.

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## Municipal Partnerships with Ukraine: New Opportunities for Canadian Communities

*This article is a guest contribution from Cities4Cities, which is helping Ukrainian communities establish inter-municipal partnerships with international municipalities.*

Over the past four years, **municipal partnerships with Ukraine** have grown drastically across Europe. What started primarily as humanitarian support has become something more practical: a platform for mutual learning, resilience-building, and international cooperation.



Today, Ukraine has many active partnerships with European municipalities and regions and in the United States. These relationships are not only focused on support, but also on exchange of experience. This shift reflects a broader reality. Ukrainian municipalities have been operating under extraordinary pressure while continuing to deliver public services, protect critical infrastructure, adapt schools and healthcare systems, respond to energy disruptions, manage large-scale internal population displacement, and make rapid decisions in highly uncertain conditions. Many European and U.S. municipalities now see cooperation with Ukraine as an opportunity to learn from real-world experience in resilience, emergency preparedness, energy security, flexible governance, community mobilization and others.

**For Saskatchewan municipalities, this type of cooperation creates an opportunity to engage internationally in a practical and accessible way.** Partnerships do not require financial commitments or extensive administrative capacity. They begin with online exchanges between municipal professionals, sharing experiences in areas such as education, health care, veteran support, water management, rural service delivery, and economic development.

Ukrainian municipalities can offer insights in the following areas:

- emergency coordination and crisis governance;
- protection of critical infrastructure;
- energy resilience and backup systems;
- rapid decision-making under pressure;
- adapting municipal services during prolonged disruption;
- volunteer mobilization and community cohesion.

Ukrainian municipalities, on the other hand, seek long-term relationship building and knowledge exchange rather than immediate financial assistance. This means that municipalities of different sizes, including mid-sized and smaller communities can participate in international cooperation. Municipal partnerships can also provide Canadian communities with opportunities to expand their international networks, strengthen institutional knowledge, and position themselves within broader global conversations.

**Cities4Cities**, an international initiative supporting municipal partnerships with Ukraine, helps municipalities identify partners and develop cooperation grounded in realistic expectations and mutual benefit. The focus is not on formalized agreements, but on practical cooperation and long-term relationships.

Canadian municipalities have valuable expertise to share. At the same time, Ukrainian municipalities offer lessons in resilience that are becoming increasingly relevant globally.

At a time when municipalities everywhere are navigating uncertainty and rapid change, international cooperation at the local level offers communities an opportunity to learn directly from one another while building stronger and more connected local governance.

- Contributing to SUMA's communication efforts with the interest of keeping sector members informed and engaged

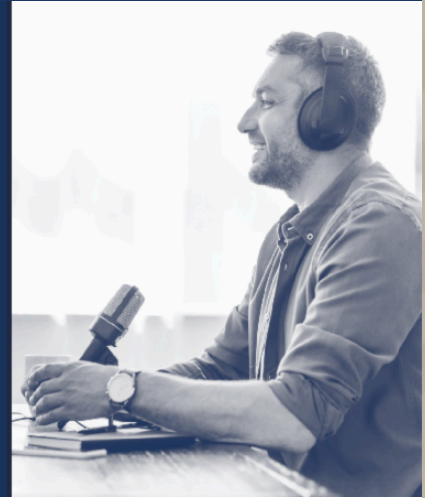

## MuniCast Season 10: Episodes 4 and 5 Now Available!

During Convention 2026, **MuniCast** host Christopher Brown connected with key voices important to SUMA members.

**S10:E4 – Provincial Conversations, Municipal Priorities** features timely discussions with the Hon. Eric Schmalz, Minister of Government Relations, and Carla Beck, Leader of the Official Opposition. Both address shared challenges facing Saskatchewan municipalities, highlighting infrastructure pressures, rising costs, and limited resources. Minister Schmalz speaks to provincial supports like the Municipal Revenue Sharing Program, the importance of regional collaboration, and ongoing engagement with municipal leaders. Beck reinforces these themes, emphasizing the need for communities to work together and advocate collectively for municipal priorities.

In **S10:E5 – Working Better Together**, the conversation continues with leaders from SUMAssure, SUMInvest, and the Saskatchewan Economic Development Alliance (SEDA). The discussion highlights how each organization was created in direct response to municipal needs and how collaboration continues to support stronger, more resilient communities. Throughout the episode, all speakers emphasize a shared philosophy: collaboration makes communities stronger.

Together, these episodes highlight a clear message: when municipalities collaborate with each other and with partners they are better equipped to meet today's challenges and build stronger communities for the future.

What if three governments could deliver stronger services at lower cost — simply by choosing to work together? In the Lac La Ronge region, that's exactly what's happened.

On **Thursday, June 4 at 10:00 a.m.**, join us for the webinar ***Better Together: Co-Governance Lessons from the Lac La Ronge Region*** to learn how a First Nation and two municipalities built 20 years of partnership, and what it means for communities across the province.

Over the past 20 years, the Lac La Ronge Indian Band, the Town of La Ronge, and the Village of Air Ronge have built some of the most developed co-governance models in the province. Together, they now jointly manage water treatment, fire services, and waste management — and are exploring shared recreation services next. By combining their expertise and resources, they've been able to provide more robust services than any of them could deliver alone, at a lower cost to each government.

But the impact goes beyond efficiency. Through this partnership, they are building trust and mutual understanding — and in doing so, they're living out the spirit of Truth and Reconciliation and the spirit and intent of the Treaty relationship.

As First Nations and municipalities across Saskatchewan face growing pressure to maintain quality services with shrinking resources, the lessons from Lac La Ronge are both timely and practical. This webinar is for First Nation and municipal leaders, administrators, and anyone working on intergovernmental collaboration. Join representatives from the Lac La Ronge Indian Band and the Town of La Ronge as they share:

- How the partnership was built — and what made it work
- The co-governance models they've developed across multiple service areas
- The challenges they've navigated and how trust was established over time
- Practical lessons for other communities ready to explore working together

## OTHER UPDATES

### Emergency Declaration and Provincial Disaster Assistance Program

If you are a community leader and your municipality is needing support, visit [Requesting SPSA Assistance](#) on [saskpublicsafety.ca](http://saskpublicsafety.ca) or contact your SPSA Emergency Services Officer (ESO). If you do not know the contact information for your ESO, contact the SPSA's general inquiry line at 1-800-667-9660 (option 5, then option 1).

#### Emergency Declaration and Provincial Disaster Assistance Program

The SPSA's website also contains information and templates for municipalities to use if they need to make an [emergency declaration](#) to exercise additional authorities to deal with an emergency or

make a designation through the [Provincial Disaster Assistance Program](#) (PDAP) to receive financial support.

Municipalities should encourage their residents to:

- Download the [SaskAlert app](#) which sends alerts about emergencies in real-time so they can keep themselves, their loved ones and their property safe.
- View current fire bans and restrictions in Saskatchewan using the SPSA interactive [fire ban map](#).
- [Prepare for an emergency](#) in case they need to take care of themselves and their family.

## Advisory for Municipalities from the Ombudsman Saskatchewan

The **Ombudsman Saskatchewan** is advising municipalities in Saskatchewan of the following important points about their investigation process:

1. The Ombudsman does not attend at municipal offices unannounced;
2. All Ombudsman staff carry Ombudsman-issued photo identification and it will be presented upon request of municipal staff; and
3. The Ombudsman does not issue verbal recommendations. If we are investigating, we would have sent a written Notice of Investigation. We also provide written NOT verbal recommendations.

If you are ever in doubt, please contact the Ombudsman Saskatchewan office at 1-800-667-9787 and ask to speak to a manager to confirm the office's involvement.

## WorkSafe Saskatchewan Celebrates Safety Leadership

WorkSafe Saskatchewan recognized safety leaders from across the province last week at the **2026 Safe Worker and Safe Employer Awards**, which celebrate individuals and organizations who are helping make workplaces safer across Saskatchewan. WorkSafe Saskatchewan, the workplace safety partnership between the Saskatchewan Workers' Compensation Board (WCB) and the Ministry of Labour Relations and Workplace Safety presents these awards.

The recipient of the 2026 Safe Worker Award is **Matthew Walker**, an operator with the **City of Melville** - one of SUMA's member municipalities.

Walker earned recognition for his proactive approach to identifying hazards and improving everyday work. In his role, he helps maintain water and sewer lines and supports a range of public works activities, from street sanding and snow removal to equipment operation and repairs. He is known for speaking up about safety concerns, completing equipment inspections and hazard assessments and working with co-workers to find safer ways to complete tasks.

One example involved identifying that a tool used in street sanding created unnecessary physical strain. Walker helped develop a lighter version that reduced ergonomic hazards by more than 50 per cent and improved efficiency, making the task safer and easier for workers of different sizes and strengths. He later shared the improvement during a safety meeting so others could adopt the safer option.

## Why the Targeted Sector Support (TSS) Funding Grant Matters

Municipalities often face resource constraints, administrative hurdles, and governance complexities for starting new or costly initiatives beyond normal operations of the municipality. **Targeted Sector Support (TSS) Grant Funding** directly addresses these issues by reviewing applications to fund **75% of these costs** with the intent to:

- **Encourage Inter-Community Collaboration:** Projects must involve at least one partner municipality or community, fostering regional unity and shared solutions.
- **Enhance Governance and Capacity:** Funding supports training, restructuring, and strategic planning that elevates municipal leadership and administration.
- **Drive Innovation in Service Delivery:** From emergency management plans to regional land use strategies, TSS-funded projects improve efficiency and responsiveness.

Each project can receive up to **75% of eligible costs, capped at \$100,000 maximum funding**, making it a high-impact, low-barrier opportunity for municipalities to innovate and grow.

**TSS** is a portion of Municipal Revenue Sharing (\$1.5 million per fiscal year) used to encourage inter-community collaboration, help build capacity and promote good governance in all Saskatchewan municipalities. The funds are used to support projects that help municipalities strengthen their core governance and administration responsibilities

The TSS Steering Committee is now accepting applications for funding under this program. **Applications are accepted at any time of the year and will be reviewed on a monthly basis.**
