Advocacy Update

Reports Issued on the 2025 Wildfire Season in Saskatchewan

MNP undertook an **independent review of the 2025 wildfire season** in Saskatchewan.

Many of their findings align with SUMA's advocacy – namely, suggestions to improve communications between agencies during a response, post-incident reviews that include the impacted communities, and much more robust pre-planning and mitigation efforts, particularly in communities that are at high risk.

In response to the report, the **Government of Saskatchewan has released 11 proposed immediate actions**. We commend their quick action on these items, but see room for additional improvements.

The **Provincial Auditor of Saskatchewan** also released a report based on the SPSA's resource planning for wildfires. Their audit found that the SPSA needs to:

- Develop better resource plans. Specifically, the report found that while the SPSA relies on resources such as firefighters and aircrafts, it has not taken the time to determine optimal levels needed before each wildfire season. Having inadequate planning and budgeting in this area leads to increased reliance on contracted resources, which costs time and blunts effectiveness, and increases financial impacts.
- Track and analyze the effectiveness of its resource use. Currently the SPSA does not assess or consistently track when contracted resources are required, leading to gaps where money and time could be saved.
- Prepare budgets more effectively, based on more robust resource plans and expected wildfire response plans. Actual variable costs related to wildfire response exceeded the Agency's initial budget by more than \$70 million a year over each of the last three years, demonstrating budgets do not reasonably reflect the expected costs of wildfire response each year. This is notable, given that budgets were exceeded in 2023 and 2024 as well – showing this issue is not just limited to 2025's unusually active wildfire season.
- Set and monitor an initial-attack success measure showing the extent of wildfires kept below 10 hectares in size, a key indicator of effective wildfire suppression.
- Work with communities identified as having higher wildfire risk to make sure community wildfire preparedness plans exist. The SPSA Agency identified 89 northern communities in areas at higher risk of wildfires and 21 of those communities have not completed a wildfire preparedness plan.
- The SPSA also needs to work with the Ministry of Finance to revisit the funding model for wildfire operations, formally monitor and report to its Board on the implementation of recommendations from annual wildfire season reviews, and centrally track firefighter training completion. Investing in strong resource planning and preparedness can improve response effectiveness.

The release of these reports, and the Government's subsequent planned action, highlight the importance of SUMA's advocacy efforts around the establishment of a **tri-party funding agreement** such as the former Joint Emergency Preparedness Program, which would provide much needed funding for specialized wildfire training equipment (as well as ensuring all municipal fire departments have what they need for day-to-day operations), effectively decreasing the reliance on contracted resources. They also support our call for a **centralized training centre** such as the former College of Emergency Management, which would ensure all fire departments across Canada are operating at the same level of expertise and that federal, provincial, and municipal representatives are included in communications for cases when wildfires cross jurisdictional boundaries. This will shorten response times and prevent further damage from occurring.

Overall, we believe the best course of action is a significant **reinvestment in municipal emergency services by all orders of government** to ensure municipal fire departments and other emergency responders have access to the training and equipment required to respond to emergencies as safely and effectively as possible.

Finally, we are pleased to see a commitment from the Government of Saskatchewan to undertake **post-incident reviews** that involve impacted communities with clear accountability and oversight, as well as directing the SPSA to craft an action plan that ensures consistent and clear communication of mental health supports available across the organization. We would like to see the Government commit to further engagement with impacted communities both during and after an emergency. We'd also like to see funding for additional **mental health supports** provided in addition to the information. This supports our cornerstone advocacy issue, mental health and addictions.

Response to the Provincial Auditor's Report on the Saskatchewan Health Authority's Use of Travel Nurses

Findings from the 2026 Provincial Auditor's Report reinforce the pressures municipalities continue to experience across Saskatchewan's health and social systems. **Challenges in healthcare staffing remain a key issue**, with the Saskatchewan Health Authority (SHA) working to balance immediate service needs with long-term workforce sustainability.

Temporary staffing, including travel nurses, has helped fill critical gaps, but it also highlights broader workforce challenges. Differences in compensation, additional training requirements, and impacts on continuity of care point to the need for more stable, long-term staffing solutions.

The Auditor identified several actions for the SHA to strengthen its approach, including improving analysis of staffing decisions and overtime impacts, ensuring appropriate screening and training requirements, strengthening oversight and documentation, and exploring alternative models such as an internal float pool. These findings reinforce what municipalities have consistently seen: addressing workforce shortages requires coordinated, long-term planning rather than reliance on short-term measures.

SUMA recognizes the importance of maintaining service continuity while addressing staffing gaps, but continues to advocate for a **comprehensive recruitment and retention strategy for healthcare workers across Saskatchewan**. Stable staffing is essential to ensure consistent service delivery, particularly in rural and northern communities.

On the social services side, SUMA acknowledges positive steps taken within the Saskatchewan Income Support (SIS) program. The one-time \$1,000 utility arrears benefit has provided meaningful relief for vulnerable residents, and improvements in how clients access supports are encouraging. Efforts to meet clients where they are—and to do so in a timely manner—represent important progress.

However, continued investment is still required. Municipalities are seeing growing demand for social housing, mental health, and addictions supports. While recent measures are welcome, **sustained funding and stronger coordination across systems will be essential to address underlying needs and reduce pressures on local communities.**

Ultimately, municipalities remain key partners in delivering solutions that reflect on-the-ground realities and support residents across Saskatchewan.

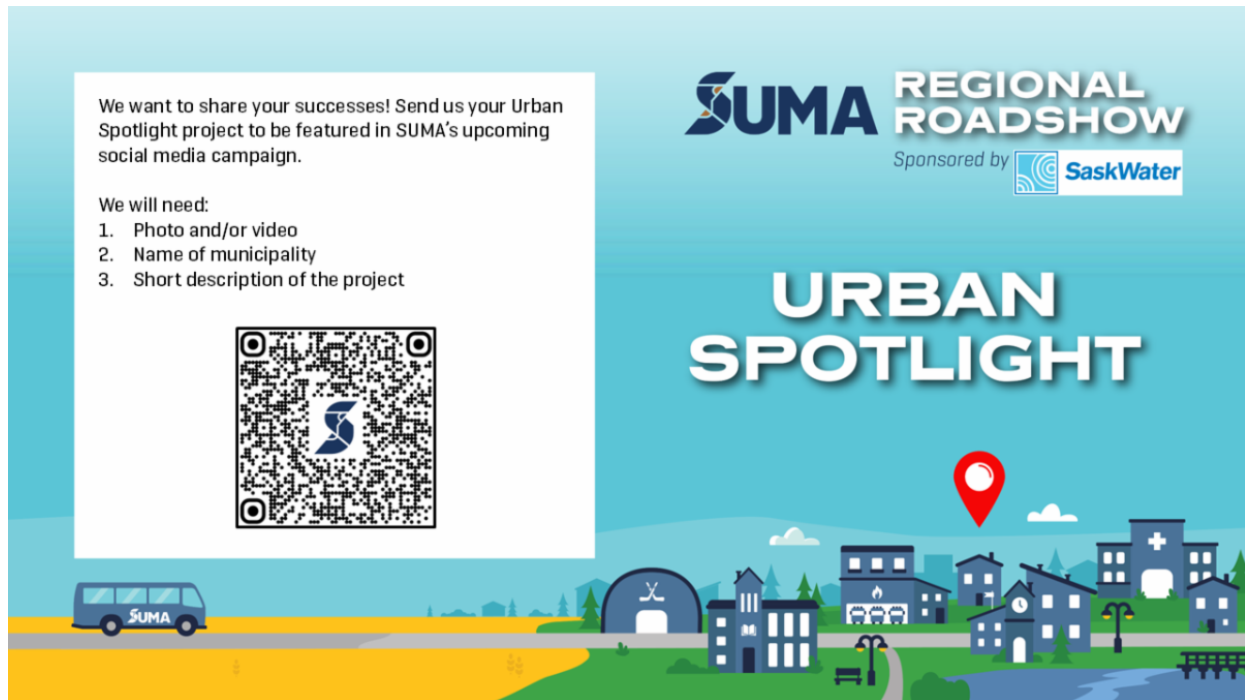

New Online Portal for Spring Flooding Support

The **Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA)** is launching a new online information portal to help Saskatchewan residents, municipalities, businesses and agricultural producers access timely information and supports related to spring flooding.

The portal includes:

- Emergency support for flooding;
- Recovery information for homeowners and municipalities;
- Business support and recovery resources;
- Information for agricultural producers;
- Environmental information; and
- Flood forecasting advisories and technical guidance.

Build Communities Strong Fund: Local Impact Stream Accepting Applications

The **Build Communities Strong Fund (BCSF) - Local Impact Stream** is now accepting applications until July 17, 2026.

The BCSF aims to support local governments (and their related organizations), and incorporated not-for-profit organizations by investing in community infrastructure projects for public use and/or benefit that:

- enhance community well-being and economic strength across the Prairie provinces; and
- enable communities—including rural, remote, and Indigenous communities—to create, improve, or modernize infrastructure that delivers lasting economic benefits.

For the first call for proposals, PrairiesCan will prioritize project proposals that:

- Are shovel-ready (with all required permits secured, environmental assessments completed, detailed design and project execution plan, confirmed cost estimates and funding in place, etc.) with significant activities and costs in the 2026-27 fiscal year
- Are leveraged with confirmed funding from other sources of support (more than 50% of total project costs)
- Are a priority as identified by local, provincial, Indigenous governments, or as identified within federal government strategies
- Contribute to the success of communities with major projects
- Generate economic benefits for the community, region, and/or Canada such as job creation and attracting investment or workers

Contributions under the Local Impact Stream will normally be \$250,000 to \$1 million per project. Projects requesting more than \$1 million should apply to the Housing, Infrastructure and Communities Canada (HICC). For more information, visit [HICC](#) for details on what is eligible under each stream.

Applicants are encouraged to submit their proposals as soon as possible for consideration as funds in 2026-27 are limited. A subsequent intake will be announced later in 2026-27. More intakes could follow subject to the availability of funds. All projects must be completed by and available for public use by March 31, 2030.

Municipalities often face resource constraints, administrative hurdles, and governance complexities for starting new or costly initiatives beyond normal operations of the municipality. **Targeted Sector Support (TSS) Grant Funding** directly addresses these issues by reviewing applications to fund **75% of these costs** with the intent to:

- **Encourage Inter-Community Collaboration:** Projects must involve at least one partner municipality or community, fostering regional unity and shared solutions.
- **Enhance Governance and Capacity:** Funding supports training, restructuring, and strategic planning that elevates municipal leadership and administration.
- **Drive Innovation in Service Delivery:** From emergency management plans to regional land use strategies, TSS-funded projects improve efficiency and responsiveness.

Each project can receive up to **75% of eligible costs, capped at \$100,000 maximum funding**, making it a high-impact, low-barrier opportunity for municipalities to innovate and grow.

TSS is a portion of Municipal Revenue Sharing (\$1.5 million per fiscal year) used to encourage inter-community collaboration, help build capacity and promote good governance in all Saskatchewan municipalities. The funds are used to support projects that help municipalities strengthen their core governance and administration responsibilities

The TSS Steering Committee is now accepting applications for funding under this program. **Applications are accepted at any time of the year and will be reviewed on a monthly basis.**
