Advocacy Update

Stronger Together: Advocacy at the Western Canadian Municipal Association Meeting

Last month, SUMA President Randy Goulden and CEO Jean-Marc Nadeau attended the annual **Western Canadian Municipal Association (WCMA)** meeting.

Topics discussed included the need for predictable, long-term infrastructure funding that is flexible enough to work for all sizes of municipalities; the need for other orders of government to invest in trade and economic corridors such as roads, bridges, rails, and pipelines; the future of contract policing; strengthened support for municipal fire departments, including funding and standardized training; and discussions around AI data centres in Canadian municipalities.



While our municipalities differ in size and location, many of our core needs remain the same. Partnerships such as the WCMA strengthen our advocacy and provide better outcomes for all members.

RCMP Municipal Cost Distribution

The Police Act, 1991 provides the Ministry of Community Safety with authority to distribute costs to municipalities, and the formula utilized to calculate the rate payable is outlined in section 7.02(1) of *The Police Regulations*.

Historically, the percentage increase in per capita rates has been equal to the percentage increase approved for the RCMP budget in a given year. For 2026-27, this increase totaled 20.4%, which is

significantly higher than in previous years, reflecting the provincial government's commitment to policing and public safety in Saskatchewan.

As a result of the magnitude of this increase, it has been determined that the corresponding increase in per capita rates will be **phased-in over a four-year period to provide municipalities with an opportunity to financially plan and manage the overall impact over an extended period**. Therefore, beginning in 2026-27, the percentage increase in the per capita rate that will be used to calculate costs to municipalities has been set at **5.1%**.

The 2026-27 rates are as follows:

- With a detachment: \$103.54 (increased from \$98.52 in 2026-27)
- Without a detachment: \$64.06 (increased from \$64.06 in 2026-27)

Advocating for Saskatchewan Municipalities in National Data Centre Responsible Principles Guidelines

The Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) recently consulted SUMA regarding a federal initiative led by Minister of Artificial Intelligence and Digital Innovation Evan Solomon, which proposes five core principles for responsible data centre development covering lasting local benefits, electricity costs, water use and environmental impacts, local transparency, and strategic value for Canada.

In response, SUMA submitted feedback emphasizing that while a federal framework is a strong starting point, its true effectiveness depends on protecting local capacity, infrastructure, and community decision-making. SUMA's feedback focused closely on how each principle impacts municipalities:

- **Lasting Local Benefits:** Capital investment scale does not automatically equal long-term community value. SUMA stressed the need to weigh initial investments against ongoing local costs and infrastructure demands.
- **Electricity Cost & Capacity Protection:** Principles must address not just costs, but also grid reliability, capacity, and infrastructure so that local ratepayers and municipalities are not left carrying the risk.
- **Water Use & Environmental Safeguards:** Frameworks must require project-specific, transparent, and ongoing reporting on water consumption and environmental footprints.
- **Transparency & Early Engagement:** Affected host municipalities and affected communities must receive timely information early in the process to meaningfully inform local planning, while strictly respecting established municipal approval and zoning processes.
- **Strategic Value for Canada:** National and provincial goals must align with the actual capacity and interests of the host municipality, other impacted hometowns and their residents.

SUMA will continue to monitor the progress of this initiative.

Meeting with the Conservative Party of Canada Saskatchewan Caucus

We were pleased to meet with members of the **Conservative Party of Canada (CPC) Saskatchewan Caucus** on August 24 to discuss matters of mutual concern.

We talked about the need for a renewed, long-term, tri-party municipal infrastructure program, not only to capitalize on growth opportunities in expanding communities, but also to recognize smaller urban municipalities as regional hubs that provide essential infrastructure, programs, and services for broader regional populations beyond their borders. This includes the need to move towards allowing shovel worthy projects as opposed to shovel ready projects, which are often subject to inflationary pressures due to upfront assessment costs and delayed approval processes.

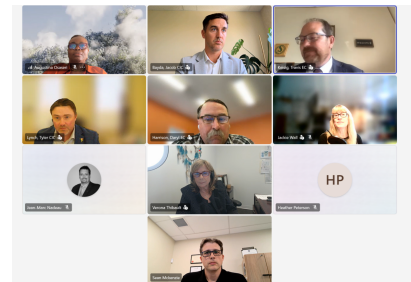
We also discussed public safety, emergency services, and RCMP policing. SUMA stressed the need for the federal government to significantly increase RCMP funding for recruitment and retention, as well as to commit to maintaining contract policing beyond 2032.

We heard from CPC Caucus members of challenges in smaller communities in obtaining postal codes for things such as online deliveries and voting in elections. This is not an issue SUMA has previously heard of, and we will be engaging with villages and resort villages to determine the scope of this issue.

Lastly, we discussed red tape reduction, at both the provincial and federal level, to help minimize cost escalations for municipal projects and services. SUMA and our members are encouraged to bring examples forward to our Saskatchewan MPs so that these can be addressed at the federal level.

Wind and Solar Stakeholder Meeting

On August 27 SUMA participated in a **stakeholder consultation with Legislative Secretaries Travis Keisig and Daryl Harrison regarding wind turbines regulations**, along with representatives from the Saskatchewan Economic Development Alliance (SEDA).



In 2024, the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities approved a resolution requesting that the Government:

- Establish provincial standards and regulations for wind turbine design constraints, including but not limited to setbacks and height restrictions; and
- If standards and regulations for wind turbines are not introduced, implement a moratorium on wind projects in the province until regulations are established.

In response to this resolution, the meeting provided an opportunity for the Legislative Secretaries to gather various perspectives on the current processes for wind and solar development and to better understand the challenges, opportunities, and considerations for potential future provincial policies and regulations.

Pre-Budget Advocacy

Every year, SUMA provides pre-budget submissions to the Government of Saskatchewan, identifying areas for investment in the municipal sector and adjacent services. This year, we prepared six submissions, targeting nine ministers:

- Minister of Community Safety
- Minister of Government Relations
- Minister of Highways
- Minister of Environment
- Minister of Advanced Education
- Minister of Education
- Minister of Health
- Minister of Mental Health and Addictions, Seniors and Rural and Remote Health
- Minister of Social Services

All were all largely focused on financial and regulatory pressures municipalities are facing and how targeted provincial investments could alleviate these challenges and improve local service delivery and community resilience. We look forward to responses from these Ministers and will ensure SUMA members remain updated on our advocacy.

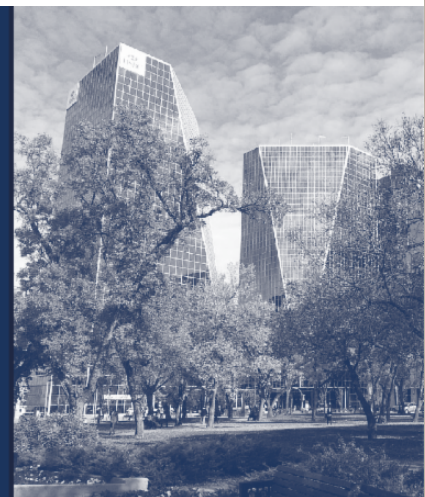

Why the Targeted Sector Support (TSS) Funding Grant Matters

Municipalities often face resource constraints, administrative hurdles, and governance complexities for starting new or costly initiatives beyond normal operations of the municipality. **Targeted Sector Support (TSS) Grant Funding** directly addresses these issues by reviewing applications to fund **75% of these costs** with the intent to:

- **Encourage Inter-Community Collaboration:** Projects must involve at least one partner municipality or community, fostering regional unity and shared solutions.
- **Enhance Governance and Capacity:** Funding supports training, restructuring, and strategic planning that elevates municipal leadership and administration.
- **Drive Innovation in Service Delivery:** From emergency management plans to regional land use strategies, TSS-funded projects improve efficiency and responsiveness.

Each project can receive up to **75% of eligible costs, capped at \$100,000 maximum funding**, making it a high-impact, low-barrier opportunity for municipalities to innovate and grow.

TSS is a portion of Municipal Revenue Sharing (\$1.5 million per fiscal year) used to encourage inter-community collaboration, help build capacity and promote good governance in all Saskatchewan municipalities. The funds are used to support projects that help municipalities strengthen their core governance and administration responsibilities

The TSS Steering Committee is now accepting applications for funding under this program. **Applications are accepted at any time of the year and will be reviewed on a monthly basis.**
