ADVOCACY UPDATE

SUMA reacts to Throne Speech

SUMA CEO Jean-Marc Nadeau attended the **Throne Speech** given by the province last week, and SUMA published a media release with our reaction to the promises made and steps taken by the government so far.

We've advocated the government for changes to policy that would improve affordability and quality of life in Saskatchewan's communities for some time, and while some of the promised items announced in the Throne Speech are a continuation from the last budget, others address some of the growing need for community-wide care. SUMA was pleased to see continued commitment to the Municipal Revenue Sharing formula, and the increase in funding to the Community Rink Affordability Grant. However, as mental health and addictions, and housing remain key advocacy issues for SUMA, we hope to see more resources and funding allocated to community safety and healthcare in the new year.

Multi-Material Stewardship Western Household Packaging and Paper Stewardship Program Survey

The provincial government has approved the Multi-Material Stewardship Western (MMSW) Household Packaging and Paper Stewardship Program Plan, which marks a transition to a **full extended producer responsibility (EPR) model**.

SUMA welcomes this model and appreciates the excellent work that MMSW is doing with the EPR program.

However, we realize the timeline set out for the transition is not realistic for all our members. As such, we have been advocating for an extension of the EPR timeline to 2029, or funding support for municipalities that may not be able to adjust their existing contracts by 2027.

SUMA recognizes the unique challenges faced by urban municipalities, and is here to provide **tools** and support to help ensure the next four years are as successful as possible for you, your fellow council members, and your municipality as a whole.

To help you get started on the right foot, we have put together a **list of resources for elected officials**. These tools are useful whether it's your first term or tenth, so we encourage all elected officials to bookmark this page and revisit it often.

SUMA's Advocacy Following the 2024 Provincial Election

Congratulations to both the returning provincial government (the Saskatchewan Party), and the official opposition (the Saskatchewan New Democrats), on their wins during the 2024 Saskatchewan General Election. SUMA looks forward to the cooperative work ahead, and will soon be sitting down with Cabinet ministers to discuss matters important to our members. We will also

continue to advocate on the issues brought forth during our provincial election campaign:

Municipal Revenues

Municipal governments are the orders of government closest to and most accessed by the public. Urban municipalities own 60 per cent of public infrastructure, such as roads, water, wastewater treatment, recreation, green spaces and fire halls, to name a few. To maintain these systems, municipalities must run balanced operating budgets. **Despite ever-increasing responsibilities, streams of funding available to municipalities have not increased**; municipalities still have only property taxes and grants from other orders of government to rely on for income.

Municipalities also want to see **simplified property assessments for property taxes**, **more funding for next generation infrastructure**, such as landfills, hospitals, and green infrastructure, and **support for municipal growth with opportunities to help retain newcomers**.

Municipal Responsibilities

Municipalities work under regulations over which they have little control. For example, many of our communities are governed by *The Police Act 1991*, which on longer fits the needs or perception of public safety in the modern world. We want to see holistic changes to the Act that will allow police to focus on enforcement, while including other professionals in cases where necessary to provide wrap-around care.

Municipalities are also seeking support with bylaw enforcement and prosecution through supports for education and by increasing the scope of fines that municipalities can add to tax rolls.

SUMA wants to see support for new technology and education concerning landfill closures, and support for the Municipal Eco-Action Centre, which will help municipalities across the province navigate climate change and resilience plans through grassroots support and knowledge. Municipalities need programs and investments which will attract newcomers and help them settle and continue to live in urban communities.

Provincial Downloading

Municipalities do not have the fiscal capacity to handle social services, housing, and shelters, nor should they be responsible for providing these basic needs, which fall inside the provincial government purview. However, time and again, municipalities are required to step in to relieve the stress their communities feel directly. The province must step up and provide better help to residents, or it will continue to cost municipalities time and resources they simply do not have. We have expressed our concerns over current mental health and addictions policies and housing issues regularly. In particular, SIS and SAID need drastic improvements in order to be helpful to the people who require these services.

The government must also take a firm stance on **climate change**, and provide **environmental leadership**. Saskatchewan is one of the few provinces in Canada without a wetland policy, which is necessary to ensure sustainable water management practices.

2025 Resolutions Policy

Resolutions are one way SUMA members can get their issues to the forefront of our advocacy efforts, and it's never too early to start thinking of those you might submit. Now is a good time to review the guidelines in the 2025 Resolutions Policy. You can access the document here.

As is our policy, only those resolutions that are absolutely critical and could not possibly have been included in the Convention package will be brought forward after the January 31 deadline, and only then with justification for why it is both urgent and emergent. Any other late resolutions will be considered by the SUMA Board after Convention.



Targeted Sector Support (TSS) Moves to a Continuous Process

Grants Available for Facilitating Independence

Facilitating Independence is a process that focuses on supporting older adults to live as independently as they wish to, in their location of choice. The goal is to provide supportive services and options which allow older adults to live a meaningful and freely chosen life, in their home and community.

Grant funding was provided to 10 organizations in 2023 for projects that will be carried out in 2024. Based on the success of the first Facilitating Independence grant programs, the Saskatchewan Seniors Mechanism (SSM) has another **approximately \$200K in 2025 available for one-time funding for micro-grants/seed money** to organizations that serve older adults, community groups, or other interested organizations to develop/pilot new approaches for providing supportive services to older adults. Provide Feedback on the General 2024 Municipal Elections

Now that the 2024 Municipal Elections are over, Government Relations wants municipalities across Saskatchewan to **provide feedback through this** <u>survey</u>.

The province wants to hear about how municipalities set up their elections, the ways in which voters cast their ballots, what difficulties municipalities encountered, and anything else that may be relevant to improving the local election system. The results will provide a starting point for discussions with stakeholders regarding potential legislative and regulatory improvements.

Canada Housing Infrastructure Fund (CHIF)

Housing, Infrastructure and Communities Canada has launched its application intake for the \$1 billion direct delivery stream of the Canada Housing Infrastructure Fund (CHIF).

They are now accepting proposals from eligible applicants, such as municipalities and Indigenous communities, for projects with total eligible costs ranging between \$1 million and \$100 million, under a continuous intake stream while the intake remains open, until March 31 at 3:00 pm ET.

Projects may be pulled for assessment at various times during the intake period, with projects

being recommended for approval prior to the intake closing on March 31 and on May 19 at 3:00 p.m. ET for Indigenous applicants.

In order to support Indigenous-led projects, at least 10 per cent of the funding envelope will be dedicated to eligible Indigenous recipients.

Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency's CAR Signage Incentive Project

The Saskatchewan Public Safety Agency (SPSA) CAR Signage Incentive Project aims to provide assistance with the cost of road name and civic address signage for Saskatchewan communities.

The Civic Address Registry (CAR) program works with communities to **improve identification of property locations for 9-1-1 operators**, **dispatch services and emergency responders**. Communities that join CAR can participate in free training and access resources that locate properties more quickly and accurately. The CAR Signage Incentive Project also hopes to increase use of physical signage to assist in emergency response. There is no cost to participate in the CAR program or to apply for the incentive. The application form will be **available for submission starting November 21**.


Municipal Revenue Sharing Declaration of Eligibility

Municipalities are required to annually report their compliance with eligibility requirements to receive their Municipal Revenue Sharing (MRS) grant by completing an online Declaration of Eligibility (declaration). The unique link and password for the online declaration was emailed to each municipality on November 15. If you have not received it, please email grcompliance@gov.sk.ca.

The deadline for submission of the declaration is **January 31**. Please ensure it is submitted by the deadline to Government Relations, even if the municipality does not meet all eligibility requirements.
