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

# **Virtual SUMA Sector Meeting on January 16**



On Tuesday January 16 from 9:00 a.m. to 3:45 p.m., join us online to discuss sector specific issues with your peers and discover new ideas during the 2024 Virtual SUMA Sector Meeting.

We will spend the morning together to hear a brief update on SUMA's governance review and advocacy work, updates from SUMA partners, and a keynote presentation from Laura Lawrence, a Saskatchewan author and educator. For the afternoon, we will break out into our sectors – cities, towns, and villages, resort villages, and northern municipalities – to share your successes during hometown proud, take in an education session specifically designed for your sector, and discuss sector relevant issues in an open forum. Discussions at sector meetings are driven by members. We encourage you to bring topics for discussion during the open forum.

The Sector Meeting is open to representatives from all SUMA member municipalities. The cost to attend is \$40 per person.

### **ADVOCACY UPDATE**

# **Working Toward Change**

On November 27, representatives from **SUMA's executive committee met in Brandon with the Western Canadian Municipal Associations** to discuss topics important to SUMA and our sister organizations in the West. All attending members put forth a joint **news release** in support of enhanced collaboration between all bodies of government.

Later in the week SUMA's executive also attended the bi-annual meeting of the Photo Speed Enforcement Committee, which delivers traffic safety grants to municipalities and First



Nations. They also attended meetings with the Rural Road Reclassification Committee, which reviews grant funding for municipalities related to the many kilometers of provincial roads they maintain.

Today, **SUMA** continued with our pre-budget advocacy by attending the Municipal Forum, where representatives from Government Relations, and SARM were in attendance. SUMA's topics of discussion included municipal revenue sharing, PST, the Canada Community-Building Fund housing criteria, a consultation protocol agreement, property assessment, and municipal census. **Tomorrow, we will meet with the Minister of Finance Donna Harpauer**, and discuss Municipal Revenue Sharing (MRS) and the impact of PST on construction services. Later in the week, **our executive will attend the SUMA Executive and Board meetings on Thursday and Friday, respectively**.

On December 14, our executive will be meeting with ministers Makowsky (Minister of Social Services) and Hindley (Minister of Health).


# Hotel Reservations Not Open Until January

# **Submit a Nomination for SUMA's Service Awards**

Do you know a longstanding municipal employee or elected official? Celebrate them at Convention 2024 with a SUMA service award!



The <u>Honorary Service Award</u> recognizes elected officials in Saskatchewan urban municipalities who have served 20 or more years on municipal council. It recognizes their long-term dedication to, and involvement in, their local communities.

The <u>Scoop Lewry Award</u> is presented in recognition of outstanding service in municipal government or administration, on a local, provincial, and national basis. Those eligible to be nominated are elected officials, administrators, SUMA officials, personnel in the Ministry of Government Relations, and personnel in First Nations and Métis Relations.

### **Election Supplies and Ballots**

Since the 1997 election, SUMA has been offering **election forms, supplies and ballot printing** to our members. It provides a one-stop shop for all SUMA members with the assurance that supplies will be up-



to-date, and a staff member available to answer questions or refer them to the appropriate contacts at Government Relations.

For ballots, SUMA members must ensure orders are placed a minimum of 15 business days prior to advance poll date; this will allow ballots to arrive in time. Please note SARM members are only able to order supplies from SUMA, not ballots.

Member Advantages

- Substantial cost savings, based on bulk purchasing of supplies and bulk processing of ballots
- Election forms as prescribed by *The Local Government Election Act* accurately reproduced ready for use on election day
- Forms and supplies shipped using the most cost effective method for each individual municipality (within one to two business days of order receipt)
- When the order is received by the SUMA office within 15 business days prior to the advance poll date, guaranteed processing of ballot orders to meet the limited turn-around time between close of nominations, advance poll, and election dates. Orders received less than 15 business days prior to the advance poll date cannot be guaranteed.

# The Encouraging Community Housing Options (ECHO) - Housing Plan Component Program



The Government of Saskatchewan's Encouraging Community Housing Options (ECHO) - Housing Plan Component Program provides a grant to municipalities and regional partnerships to develop a ho

municipalities and regional partnerships to develop a housing plan to better understand the housing need in their communities.

Municipalities and regional partnerships can receive provincial grants of up to \$20,000 to match eligible municipal expenses. To be eligible, applicants must have the housing plan either completed by or reviewed (with recommendations) by a professional community planner or another professional approved by Saskatchewan Housing Corporation.

### **Municipal Growth Readiness**

The Municipal Growth Readiness Checklist (MGRC) is a tool to help municipalities selfassess their strengths, weaknesses, threats and opportunities. Doing this assessment will allow municipalities to focus prioritization of the most pressing risks to medium and long-term growth.

The checklist tool will allow municipalities' administrative and political officials to come to their own conclusions about the growth readiness of their municipality and what actions, if any, are needed to improve it.

Municipalities can evaluate their growth readiness by answering questions related to eight key categories of municipal responsibility. Based on the responses, the tool will provide municipalities with a score related to each category.

### **Radon Mitigation in Saskatchewan**

Radon is a colourless, odourless, and tasteless radioactive gas released when uranium decays. Homes built on soil containing uranium can be flooded with radon gas when there are cracks and gaps in foundation walls and basement floor slabs.



Radon that enters homes poses a health risk, as long-term exposure to radon can increase the risk

**of lung cancer.** The risk is particularly significant in areas with high radon concentrations in the soil, such as in some parts of Saskatchewan. Effective radon mitigation strategies are essential to protect the health and well-being of Saskatchewan residents.

Regular testing for radon is recommended, as testing allows residents to determine if high radon levels are present within their homes. If levels are above the limits recommended by Health Canada, radon mitigation systems that meet or exceed the requirements found in the National Building Code of Canada can be installed. Such systems typically involve installing either an active or passive ventilation system below basement floor slabs and sealing radon gas entry points in slabs and foundation walls.

Radon mitigation efforts in Saskatchewan empower homeowners with the knowledge and tools to address this invisible threat. By prioritizing radon mitigation, homeowners can significantly reduce the risk of lung cancer and create safer, healthier homes for their families.

### **Road Maintenance Agreements**

The Government of Saskatchewan introduced road maintenance agreements (RMAs) to allow municipalities to cover the incremental cost that occurs above regular maintenance costs due to the increased pressures of heavy or bulk hauls.

In 2021, the Ministry of Government Relations amended <u>The Municipalities Regulations</u> to allow for the setting of regional rates based on the Ministry of Highways' Area Transportation Planning Committees (APTC). These rates are to be reviewed every two years and updated based on municipal transportation services expenditures in each APTC region, as well as truck traffic, road damage and payload data from the Ministry of Highways.

The new rates are effective for 2024 and 2025, and you can view a map of the regional rates <a href="here">here</a>.
