Saskatchewan's Urban Municipalities Benefit from Provincial Investment

Provincial investments are vital to improving the quality of life in Saskatchewan's cities, towns, villages, resort villages, and northern municipalities. SUMA supports the 2025-26 provincial budget's focus on public safety, infrastructure, and health services but urges additional investments to address the mental health and addictions crisis.

SUMA is very pleased with the \$122.3 million investment to build, operate, and maintain roads and airports in northern Saskatchewan, supporting forestry and economic development for our northern municipalities.

The \$17 million increase in capital for highways throughout the province, including a \$25.4 million investment in important safety infrastructure such as guardrails and lighting, is also welcomed.

We are extremely pleased to see the investment in municipal bylaw courts, an option SUMA has long advocated for to address provincial court backlogs and unaddressed bylaw infractions.

The funding for 14 new **Safer Communities and Neighbourhoods (SCAN) officers** is appreciated, but this funding overlooks increased costs for officers and infrastructure, burdening municipalities.

We are continually grateful for the **Municipal Revenue Sharing Program**. All of Saskatchewan's municipalities will benefit from the record investment of more than \$361.8 million in the program, an increase of 6.3 per cent from last year.

With SUMA's cornerstone advocacy issue being mental health and addictions, we are encouraged by the Government's ongoing commitment to funding

addictions treatment options and look forward to addressing the root causes of this crisis together.

The additional \$9 million investment into repairing and renovating existing units to be used for social housing in Regina, Saskatoon, and Prince Albert is a key first step in addressing the mental health and addictions crisis by providing safe and stable housing for Saskatchewan's citizens.

SUMA is pleased with efforts in **recruiting and retaining physicians and nurses** in the province, including 65 new and enhanced permanent full-time nursing positions, increased funding for physician services in the province, and the addition of 10 inprovince physician training seats for family medicine. These are positive steps in addressing the shortage of healthcare professionals throughout our province.

ADVOCACY UPDATE

Presidential Election: Call for Nominations

An election for SUMA President will take place on **April 15** during the 2025 SUMA Convention and Tradeshow, and nominations are now open.

Any mayor or councillor from a SUMA member municipality in good standing is eligible to run for President, including those who have previously been elected to a SUMA Caucus. While Caucus representation is replacing the former regional director positions on SUMA's Board of Directors, the President of the Board will continue to be elected from the floor at Convention.

Those interested in running are required to **submit nomination papers 15 days prior** to the election date, by **11:59 p.m. CST on March 31**. Nominees must have their **papers signed by two other elected officials** from any SUMA member municipality in good standing.

All candidates who have filed their nomination papers before March 22 are eligible to submit a **one-page platform document** (not exceeding 1,000 words) with photo that will be posted to the SUMA website and included in a one-time-only email to SUMA member municipalities.

Before submitting your nomination papers, please take the time to read more about what it means to be President of the SUMA Board of Directors:

The position of President is a **significant time and travel commitment**. In addition to chairing quarterly Board meetings, the President sits as ex-officio on all caucuses and can attend any caucus meeting they choose. The President is typically expected to attend as many events as possible - Convention, the Virtual SUMA Summit, and the Regional Roadshow, to name a few.

The President is the face of the organization and therefore is often the first point of contact for members, other government officials, and many partner organizations. The President is also required to be available for media requests.

Being on the Board of Directors, whether as President or sitting on a caucus, means you'll need to keep your eye on things that impact the bigger picture; SUMA advocates for issues that impact all urban municipalities in Saskatchewan. It involves working closely with other orders of government, provincial and federal. You will also be a main point of contact for all other Board and caucus members, and work closely with SUMA administration. It is bigger than just your community.

SUMA represents all Saskatchewan urban municipalities - from the smallest of villages to the largest of cities - and that starts with the President of the Board of Directors. If you're ready to take on that challenge, we encourage you to submit your nomination.

Federal Plastics Registry

The **Federal Plastics Registry** is a tool launched in 2024 that compels plastic producers, service providers for the management of plastics, and other companies across the plastics value chain to help monitor and track plastic from the time it is produced up to its end of life. By better tracking plastic through its full life cycle, both governments and industry will be better equipped to address plastic waste and pollution through increased transparency and sound, robust, evidence-based decision-making.

The Federal Plastics Registry requires **reporting on the quantity and types of plastic put on the Canadian market and how plastic moves through the economy**. It includes packaging, singleuse and disposable products, construction, transportation, electronics and electrical equipment, tires, textiles and apparel, fishing and aquaculture equipment, and agriculture and horticulture equipment.

There is significant need for all sectors and stakeholders in Canada to take action to reduce plastic

waste and pollution. In 2019, Canadians threw away 4.4 million tonnes of plastic waste, only nine per cent of which was recycled. Municipalities can do their part by encouraging plastics producers, distributors, service providers, and other companies to use the Federal Plastics Registry.

The first reporting deadline for the Federal Plastics Registry is **September 29** for the 2024 calendar year.

Broadband Connectivity

The **Saskatchewan Broadband Action Committee** (SBAC) is a cross-sector and community-based group of provincial, local, and Indigenous organizations and networks. The Committee was formed through a collective concern over the issues and lost opportunities for all citizens related to broadband connectivity across the province. SUMA is co-chair of the SBAC.

SBAC's key focus is to assist with addressing long-standing issues affecting broadband connectivity and advise and direct actions leading to a shared strategy, investment, and vision.

The Need for Change:

- 1. Saskatchewan continues to receive the lowest per capita investment from the Federal Government.
- 2. There is a persistent digital divide for individuals living on First Nations and in rural and remote communities.
- 3. 53 per cent of the province does not have access to broadband 50/10 high-speed (the CRTC's national standard).
- 4. Saskatchewan is currently the only province without a provincial plan related to improving broadband infrastructure.
- 5. A large portion of the Saskatchewan population lives in rural or small urban areas, where connectivity is a concern.

Call to Action:

As a committee, SBAC has outlined five key calls to action for the Provincial and Federal Governments to develop a Provincial Broadband Plan and receive greater investment in broadband infrastructure – outlined in the 2025 SBAC Briefing Note.

To further SBAC's cause, our ask of you is to continue to raise this issue and ask questions with your local MLA and the Provincial Government. Together, we can achieve broadband parity for all Saskatchewan residents, regardless of address.

Policy Brief: A Case for Renewal of Municipal Revenues in Saskatchewan

Municipal governments in Saskatchewan face significant challenges. An **over reliance on property** taxes, coupled with the need to address expanding social issues, services to citizens, and infrastructure challenges has put enormous fiscal pressure on municipalities. Only those resolutions that are **absolutely critical and could not possibly have been included in the Convention package** will be brought forward after the January 31 resolution deadline, and only then with justification for why it is both urgent and emergent. Any other late resolutions will be considered by the SUMA Board after Convention.



SUMA is pleased to announce the next enrollment of the University of Saskatchewan's new microcredential course, from the School of Public Health, called Municipal Leadership in Addressing Substance Use Harms, starting April 1. This is a 40 hour, 8-week asynchronous online course. It is equivalent to 1 university credit unit. The class will be taught by Dr. Barbara Fornssler, an Assistant Professor at the School of Public Health, University of Saskatchewan, and by Jennifer Chouinard BA BSW MPP, a PhD Candidate at the Johnson Shoyama Graduate School of Public Policy, University of Regina.

The course addresses the following four topics:

- 1. The Substance Use and Addictions Continuum: The Role of Stigma in Health
- 2. Substance Use Interventions: Harm Reduction and Prevention; Health and Wellness Promotion; Treatment and Recovery
- 3. Evidence and Strategic Intervention: Municipal Leadership
- 4. Public Policy, Engagement, and Advocacy

This is a **policy-focused course**, ideal for professionals looking to:

- Refine their skills in articulating the complexities of substance use and stigma.
- Apply evidence-based strategies for reducing substance use harms including prevention, treatment and recovery services.
- Develop and evaluate policies in partnership with a range of health system and community stakeholders.
- Communicate effectively with the public to align health initiatives with local support services.

Course tuition is \$750 plus taxes and fees. It comes with a certificate and digital badge upon completion. If cost is a barrier to enrollment, please email Dr. Fornssler directly.

Targeted Sector Support (TSS) Moves to a Continuous Process

TSS has moved to a continuous, rolling intake process. All completed applications in the

Canada Housing Infrastructure Fund (CHIF)

Housing, Infrastructure and Communities Canada launched its application intake for the \$1 billion direct delivery stream of the Canada Housing Infrastructure Fund (CHIF).

They are now accepting proposals from eligible applicants, such as municipalities and Indigenous communities, for projects with total eligible costs ranging between \$1 million and \$100 million, under a continuous intake stream while the intake remains open, until March 31 at 3:00 pm ET.

Projects may be pulled for assessment at various times during the intake period, with projects being recommended for approval prior to the intake closing on **March 31** and on May 19 at 3:00 p.m. ET for Indigenous applicants.

In order to support Indigenous-led projects, at least 10 per cent of the funding envelope will be dedicated to eligible Indigenous recipients.
