natural hazards such as floods, wildfires, earthquakes, and droughts.

The fund is set to support large-scale projects with a minimum cost of \$20 million like diversion channels, wetland restorations, wildfire barriers, and setback levees - projects that safeguard public health and safety, protect homes, ensure essential services are not interrupted, and help protect quality of life.

Eligible applicants include municipal and regional governments; provinces and territories; Canada public and not-for-profit post-secondary institutions that partner with a Canadian municipal; and band councils and First Nation, Inuit and Métis governments.

Those wanting to be considered for funding have until **July 31, 2018** to submit an [Expression of Interest](#) to Infrastructure Canada.

Workshop and Meetings Recap

Thank you to all the SUMA members who attended events over the last two weeks. We know it was a busy time for not only us, but also you with our Cannabis Legalization Workshop, the Town, Village, and Northern Sector Meeting, and the City Mayors' Caucus. We appreciate everyone who took part in these activities.

The workshop on cannabis legalization happened May 9, attendees hearing from the 420 Clinic who discussed common misconception about cannabis; Jana Linner from MLT Aikins Law Firm who spoke about municipal responsibilities and the potential pitfalls as employers; and SUMA's policy staff who talked about what cannabis legalization means for municipalities. That evening, we also hosted an MLA reception to kick off the Town, Village, and Northern Sector Meeting.

The meeting itself got started May 10. More than 100 participants from as far as Cumberland House joined us for the full-day meeting, which featured discussions on common issues and shared solutions, a presentation by Fire Commissioner Duane McKay, and an address from Minister of Government Relations Warren Kaeding.

On May 17, Saskatchewan's city mayors met at Jackfish Lodge for the City Mayors' Caucus. At this year's caucus, topics of discussion included cannabis legalization, climate change, photo radar, and ride sharing.

Watch Your Ash Workshop

The Emerald Ash Borer, a highly destructive and invasive beetle, has killed millions of ash trees in North America. And just last year, it was found in Winnipeg, Man. years earlier than expected.

Mussels, like zebra or quagga mussels, have the potential to invade Saskatchewan waterbodies. And these aren't the tasty kind of mollusk. Invasive mussels have the potential to harm water-related infrastructure, recreational resources, fisheries, and aquatic habitats in Saskatchewan. Help prevent their spread by participating in the [2018 Saskatchewan Adult Invasive Mussel Monitoring \(AIMM\) Program](#).
