Procurement Rules for Municipalities

As of July 1, 2012, procurement for goods, services, and construction above specific thresholds will need to be posted on the <u>SaskTenders website</u>. Under the New West Partnership Trade Agreement (NWPTA), procurement of goods or services above \$75,000 and construction above \$200,000 must be conducted openly and transparently to ensure equal opportunity for suppliers in Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia.

FCM Explains Impact of Changes to Fisheries Act

The Federal Budget Implementation Act contains major changes to Canada's existing environmental legislation, including important amendments to the Fisheries Act which will have a range of implications for communities. FCM supports specific common-sense reforms to the Fisheries Act but also maintains that important questions relating to environmental protection remain to be answered. CBC Switching Off Transmitters

The CBC and Radio-Canada plan to switch off more than 600 analog transmitters on July 31, 2012. Residents of all Saskatchewan municipalities outside Regina will lose free access to the CBC and Radio-Canada over the air using bunny ears or rooftop antennae unless affected communities choose to maintain the CBC/Radio-Canada transmitters and towers themselves. In many cases, this infrastructure can also be used to distribute highspeed Internet, cell phone service, and a local community TV or radio channel.

The Canadian Association of Community Television Users and Stations (CACTUS) is encouraging municipalities to ask for local CBC and Radio-Canada transmission equipment before it is scrapped. Until June 18, the CRTC is taking comments from the public about what should happen to CBC/Radio-Canada transmitters. Affected communities can write in to ask the CRTC and CBC to make the transmitters available for local use.
