

# **So ... what's next?** MOG brought a resolution to the long-term funding issue; we review where we go from here

As part of this year's spring provincial budget, Finance Minister Rod Gantefoer finally said those sweet words municipalities had long been waiting to hear: long-term funding. A revenue sharing plan that is tied to the economy is what municipalities – both urban and rural - had long been asking for.

Throughout the 15-year lobbying effort, there was no equivocation on the priority for Saskatchewan municipalities. Although SUMA negotiated and advocated on a number of municipal issues over the years, it was the revenue sharing file that demanded the most attention. With the Municipal Operating Grant (MOG) Program now in place, SUMA is focusing its efforts on other emerging municipal priorities. The Urban Voice sat down with SUMA President Allan Earle and Chief Executive Officer Laurent Mougeot to discuss those priorities.

### Infrastructure

Economically and socially vibrant communities depend to a large degree on effective municipal infrastructure and quality municipal services, such as the supply of safe water, transportation, cultural and recreational facilities, and affordable housing. Insufficient funding over the long-term has resulted in billions of dollars in unmet local infrastructure needs in all of these areas across Saskatchewan communities. In particular, poor economic conditions in the early '90s meant that many programs that municipalities had relied on for infrastructure funding had been cut or frozen, a move that has had a dire long-term impact - a mistake that SUMA and its member municipalities insist must not be repeated.

Certainly, municipalities were encouraged by the stimulus plan within the January federal budget that channeled billions of dollars into municipal infrastructure as a means of generating economic activity and creating jobs. "This was clear acknowledgement of something that municipalities have been saying all along - that economic activity and growth happen in municipalities," said President Earle. infrastructure renewal, including the Building Canada Fund, Municipal Infrastructure Lending Program, Saskatchewan Infrastructure Growth Initiative and Municipal Economic Enhancement Program have been important steps to address infrastructure challenges in the short-term. Municipalities are making every effort to take advantage of these programs. However, the answer to the infrastructure challenge, according to Earle, is a long-term one.

SUMA - together with all Canadian municipalities through the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) – supports a long-term strategic solution that would see the three orders of government use the current twoyear window of federal infrastructure funding commitments to develop a national, coordinated, 20-year strategic plan, with implementation beginning in 2011. Earle said that the first step in this process would be for municipalities to develop a comprehensive understanding of the magnitude of the deficit in the province. "Once that gap is identified, we then can then sit down and figure out what is fair, in terms of funding distribution," he said. "Certainly, a partnership makes good sense, as all three orders of government have an interest in eliminating the infrastructure deficit," he added.

In addition, SUMA is supportive of the idea first proposed by Regina Mayor Pat Fiacco, that the federal government coordinate a national municipal infrastructure summit with key players from the provincial and municipal government, industry and the private sector.

Affordable housing is also a critical issue for many SUMA members, and it is related to the continued municipal infrastructure deficit.

### Environment

SUMA is currently working with the provin-

delivering front-line services such as safe drinking water, waste removal and recycling, ensuring that stakeholders understand the urban perspective on such issues is critical. "Our interest is in effectively managing these issues on behalf of urban municipalities by supporting growth and prosperity without compromising the environment," said Mougeot.

Water management is a complex issue that has become an emerging concern for many Saskatchewan municipalities. Responsible for managing local distribution systems, urban municipalities are important stakeholders when it comes to water management. SUMA supports a strategic, transparent approach to managing water quantity and quality, in particular:

### Effective watershed planning

The goal of watershed planning is to provide a framework to protect, maintain and restore a healthy natural watershed ecosystem. Such planning takes into account issues such as future threats to water resources, urban development, and environmentally sensitive watershed conditions.

### Province-wide Water Availability Study

The Saskatchewan Watershed Authority (SWA) is currently undertaking a four-year study to better define how much water is available throughout the province. The intent is to provide accurate, timely information to Saskatchewan's various water users.

### Water conservation

Through education, the demand for water can be reduced, improving the efficiency of its use, and reducing losses and waste. Effective water conservation protects water resources and will allow us to achieve benefits from water use at a lower cost.

The Infrastructure Stimulus Fund and other federal and provincial programs supporting

cial government and other partners on various environmental issues that are impacting member municipalities. Increasingly stringent environmental standards, potential exposure to liability and rising costs are impacting the ability of municipalities to comply with legislation and deliver quality services.

As the order of government responsible for

As the Urban Voice goes to press, the provincial government has just released its Speech from the Throne. A comprehensive water management plan was announced as one of the items on the government's agenda, and SUMA will be following up with the Ministry of Environment to determine what that means specifically for urban municipalities. Ensuring that senior orders of government and other stakeholders are aware of and clearly understand urban municipal priorities - and our position on priority issues - is critical to our success as an organization. To that end, we work very hard to ensure that SUMA is consulted and considered an equal partner in critical consultations that have an impact on urban municipalities.

Finally, I would like to take this opportunity to extend my sincere gratitude to the capable men and women who have served this great organization over the past board term. Your leadership, dedication and commitment have strengthened our position as an organization, and helped to create a stronger Saskatchewan. I wish you all the best in your future endeavors.



Since our return from the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM) meeting this past June, the association has worked diligently to deliver two key messages to the Government of Canada.

Firstly, current infrastructure programs need to be sheltered from any corrective measures to balance future federal budgets. Canadians cannot finance the federal deficits on the backs of property tax payers. Municipal

governments cannot, by law, operate with deficit budgets, and putting municipalities in a position where they would have to 'pick up the slack' would not only be irresponsible, but also mean a repeat of past mistakes.

Secondly, Canada needs a 20-year strategy to properly address municipal infrastructure needs. SUMA, along with FCM and many cities, are calling for a national summit of stakeholders from all orders of government and private sector representatives. The purpose would be to review key principles and effective strategies to create a program that will make certain that the country is properly equipped with the required infrastructure to ensure that our communities are safe, prosperous and competitive in the world market.

SUMA has met with both the Saskatchewan Conservative Caucus and Liberal representatives to share these views. SUMA has presented to the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Finance and will also be on Parliament Hill in Ottawa with FCM in November to reinforce these same messages.

It is critical that we keep these lines of communication open with federal representatives. Despite the fact that municipalities are not recognized as a separate order of government under *The Constitution Act, 1982*, SUMA has been working with FCM to ensure that municipalities can engage as a legitimate order of government in consultations with provincial and federal officials, what we often refer to as a "government to government" relationship.

Finally, municipal elections also mark the start of a new cycle for our organization. SUMA Board members are elected at regional meetings in the fall. Delegates at our Annual Convention will select a new Executive. Once key personnel are in place, we will meet to review and revise our current three- year strategic plan which will guide the association until 2012.

Our staff looks forward to continued engagement with the Board, municipal elected officials and administrators to advance, promote and protect the interests of municipal governments.

# **Board of Directors update**

The SUMA board recently met for the last time before the 2009 municipal elections. The agenda for the two day session consisted of a number of important policy items, decisions regarding the 2010 SUMA convention and a presentation of the SUMA 2010 Operating and Capital Budget.

An important highlight from the weekend meeting was the opportunity to environmental advisory committees. The two committees that meet with the new Deputy Minister of Municipal Affairs, Van Isman. Mr. Isman reassured the board that the provincial government is committed to the Municipal Sector Strategic Plan and that he is looking forward to working with SUMA. As the issue of revenue sharing has finally been resolved, the MSSP tables will continue to work towards resolving other long standing issues.

On policy related matters, the board approved two policy statements: the Multi-Material Recycling Program and the Public Safety Review Committee Recommendations. These statements can be viewed on the SUMA website at www.suma.org. The board also debated a proposed policy statement on affordable housing and examined the matter of municipal status designation. Significant discussion occurred at the **Protective Services Committee** meeting regarding the Provincial Public Safety radio system and the need to ensure that the concerns of urban municipalities regarding the cost are communicated to the provincial government.

Other topics on the agenda at the standing committees included a discussion on the Urban Highway Connector Program (UHCP), the Dutch Elm and Watershed Advisory Committees and also new corporate partnerships being developed for SUMA Advantage program.

On the matter of the UHCP, concerns have been raised by a number of municipalities with respect to how this program is being implemented. The Transportation and Community Development Committee will communicate these concerns to the Ministry and continue to monitor

the UHCP negotiation process. The transportation committee also directed the policy staff to bring a policy statement on regional airports to the next committee meeting.

At the Environment Committee meeting, directors voiced deep concern that the province is no longer engaging with several were the focus of this discussion were the Dutch Elm Disease and the Watershed Authority, as neither group have held meetings for some time. A decision was made to communicate to the Minister of the Environment on SUMA's concerns regarding the status of both committees.

The **Corporate Services Committee** looked at several updates coming to the SUMA Advantage Program, including two new partnerships that will benefit municipalities which are currently being negotiated. Further information will be communicated to municipalities once the deals are finalized.

Of interest to many were the outcomes from the Convention **Planning Committee**. Members of the committee made several decisions on speakers, entertainment and education sessions for the 2010 convention.

We have received several nominations for the Meritorious Service and Honourary Membership Awards. We are also currently seeking nominations for the Scoop Lewry Awards, which the committee will review at the December committee meeting.

At the **Resolutions Committee** meeting, the group approved the call for resolutions and the timeline for submissions for the 2010 Convention.

The next SUMA board meeting is scheduled for December 2009.

# Consultations: An important part of what we do

From letters and meetings to phone calls and emails – stakeholder consultations can take many forms.

Of late, SUMA has participated in many consultations of the more formal nature, including federal budget consultations and meetings with federal elected representatives.

These consultations are an ideal opportunity to communicate the priorities of our members. In particular, the following themes were stressed:

- Protecting existing infrastructure funding, the need for additional funding, and our desire to have future programs based on a model that is similar to the Gas Tax fund
- Resolving the municipal infrastructure deficit must be a national priority. A long-term national strategic plan is needed, and the federal government should lead this initiative
- Federal investments have provided some breathing room on the affordable housing issue, but a national discussion is required
- Extending expiring urban transit funding and the need to develop a national transit plan
- · Concerns about federal downloading to municipalities

In an effort to keep you updated on which groups SUMA is speaking to on behalf of our members, following is a summary on some of our more recent consultations:

SUMA's efforts to build strong government-to-government relationships and advocate on municipal issues continued on August 13, when our Executive Committee held a meeting with **Saskatchewan Members of Parliament and Senators** in Regina.

Municipal infrastructure was a key topic of discussion, with SUMA pressing for a national, long-term strategic plan to address the growing infrastructure deficit.

SUMA also received assurances that current federal-municipal programs – such as the Gas Tax and GST rebate programs – would not be cut back as the Federal Government begins tackling its deficit.

SUMA also met with the **Leader of the Official Opposition** on October 14. The meeting with leader Michael Ignatieff also included Member of Parliament for Wascana, Ralph Goodale. Representatives from the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities and Saskatchewan City Mayors' Caucus also attended.

SUMA also presented its recommendations for the upcoming federal budget at a hearing of the **Parliamentary Standing Committee on Finance** in Regina on October 19. SUMA was represented by President Allan Earle, and Vice-President for Cities, Fred Clipsham.

This year's pre-budget consultation focused on the impact of the world economic slowdown on Canada. The Committee wanted to investigate

the effectiveness of monetary and fiscal stimulus measures enacted by the Government of Canada, and also to explore measures that must be taken to ensure prosperity and a sustainable economic, social and environmental future.

With this theme in mind, the Committee invited all participants to share their views on the following two questions:

- What federal tax and program spending measures are needed to ensure prosperity and a sustainable future for Canadians from an economic, social and/or environmental perspective?
- What federal stimulus measures have been effective and how might relatively ineffective measures be changed to ensure that they have the intended effects?

The presentation to the Committee was an opportunity for SUMA to provide direct feedback to Members of Parliament on issues of importance to our members, with the intent to leave Committee members with a clear understanding of our priorities.

SUMA also participated in round two of the province's Environmental Regulatory Review stakeholder consultation process; an update is included on page 8.

As always, SUMA appreciates the opportunity to communicate the needs of urban municipal governments in Saskatchewan.

We look forward to future opportunities to continue this important dialogue.

# More trouble ahead for recycling programs

Municipal representatives, by now, are all familiar with the recycling situation in Saskatchewan.

Last year, the market price for baled paper and cardboard recycling materials dropped sharply, creating a severe threat to municipalities providing independent recycling services.

To mitigate the risk of independent municipal recyclers scaling back services or stopping recycling altogether, the Ministry of Environment announced 'bridge' funding to provide short-term assistance for independent municipal recyclers until a province-wide Multi-Material Recycling Program (MMRP) is in place. SUMA was one of three groups asked to administer program funding, and in May, we launched the Municipal Recycling Bridge Funding Program.

Here's a program update:

- Funds have begun flowing for those municipalities eligible for on Category I these are municipalities that provide their own independent recycling services. The 31 municipalities eligible under Category I must provide their receipts for reimbursement to SUMA before December 31, 2009.
- 92 municipalities are eligible for Category II funding these are municipalities that receive recycling services from private firms. These municipalities can expect to receive funding as early as **January 2010**.

The MMRP will develop a long-term solution to fund the recycling of household paper, cardboard, plastic, tin and glass. The end goal is to shift the responsibility for funding the recycling of household packaging from municipalities to be more fairly distributed amongst those consuming goods - including industry and consumers.

Initially, it was expected that the MMRP would be launched by the end of 2010. It is now known that the program will not be implemented within that time frame. Consequently, when the bridge funding program ends in March 2010, municipalities will face the same risks that they did before the bridge funding program began.

SUMA believes that funding for municipal recyclers is required beyond March 2010. We have been in contact with the Ministry of Environment regarding this matter to ensure that it is considered as part of provincial budget deliberations.

The province must provide additional bridge funding to support recyclers until such time as the MMRP is implemented. Failing to do so will risk the collapse of local and regional recycling efforts.

# So ... what's next? (continued from page 1)

Waste management is another emerging issue that is demanding our attention. Individual municipalities are responsible for collecting and disposing of solid waste. Despite efforts on the part of municipalities to employ effective waste management practices, increasingly stringent environmental standards are making it cost-prohibitive for many smaller communities to operate their own landfills. Concerns about close proximity to water sources, homes and businesses, groundwater contamination, air pollution and potential health problems are legitimate concerns for the Ministry of Environment, who are promoting a regional approach to waste management planning.

Under the regional model, urban and rural municipalities join together to form a regional waste management system and delegate responsibilities to a central authority. Benefits include: reduced equipment requirements, potential for expanded recycling services, and reduced rodent populations, to name a few.

For many municipalities struggling to remain environmentally compliant while delivering quality services to citizens, moving to a regional approach to waste management is the obvious response. The question becomes not if we need to move to a regional waste management model, but rather how, SUMA, the Saskatchewan Association of Rural Municipalities (SARM), the Ministry of Environment and the Association of Regional Waste Management Authorities of Saskatchewan (ARWMAS) can work together to make the regional model work.

The rising cost of recycling, and the low price of products on the market, remains a concern amongst SUMA members. Last year, SUMA worked with the Ministry of Environment to develop a program and deliver funding to independent municipal recyclers (AR-WMAS and SARC members were eligible for funding through those organizations). The funding was intended to act as a bridge until the province could introduce its Multi Material Recycling Program (MMRP). "With MMRP still at least a year away, we will be lobbying the province to ensure that municipal recyclers aren't left without support," said Mougeot. Read more about recycling on page 6.

An important element of SUMA's work is consulting with the provincial and federal governments on proposed amendments to legislation, regulation, and policy. In 2009, SUMA has been engaged in 34 separate consultations, many of which have been extensive. The largest one this year is the Ministry of Environment's Regulatory Review. There have been two full rounds of consultations, and a third one will be taking place in late November. SUMA has participated throughout this process, and has been very pleased with the degree to which municipal concerns have been addressed so far. SUMA will continue to advocate on your behalf, to ensure that municipalities can operate in an environment free of excessive regulation or unfunded costs.

## Health care

Some smaller communities in Saskatchewan are finding it challenging to recruit and retain doctors. Although municipalities have no responsibility for health care human resource issues, local leaders are feeling compelled to become involved for the betterment of their community. As a result, SUMA is increasingly hearing from our members who are concerned about what has become a difficult, expensive and time consuming process. "We've heard of significant delays in deploying doctors and of some towns spending well over \$100,000 in one year to attract one doctor," said Earle.

 Saskatchewan's Patient First Review is a comprehensive review of healthcare in Saskatchewan which looked at the healthcare system from both the client and administrative perspective (i.e. medical professionals and administrators themselves). The report, made public on October 15, contains 16 specific recommendations.

• Municipal Sector Strategic Plan (MSSP) Towns and Villages table has the 'Recruitment and Retention of Medical Professionals' as a priority agenda item. The intent is to collect facts about the challenges faced by municipalities and the efforts and expenditure that municipalities are making to recruit and retain doctors. SUMA has surveyed member municipalities on this issue, in an effort to have current, accurate information with which to approach the government. Response to this survey was very low, with only 38 urban municipalities responding. Nevertheless, the responses have provided some insight into the issues that municipalities are facing. More information can be found on the SUMA website.

# Policy is member-driven

SUMA policy priorities are determined through direction from your elected board and convention resolutions. We are made aware of potential issues at regional meetings, or from those that take the time to email, call, or write to us with particular comments and concerns. SUMA needs to hear from you in order to be sure that we're working toward delivering the results most needed in your municipalities.

As always, SUMA will closely monitor these and other issues affecting member municipalities, and work to effectively advocate and negotiate on your behalf. For example, the provincial government's October 21 Speech from the Throne will undoubtedly have an impact on our priorities, and we will be working with elected officials to ensure that your voice is heard and that member interests move forward in these areas. We will keep you apprised of any developments that occur.

It's an issue that we heard loud and clear at the SUMA convention, SUMA spring regional meetings and through regular correspondence with our members. The issue has also been taken up by various Saskatchewan media outlets. SUMA is monitoring this issue closely, and is working to ensure that member concerns are heard. Currently, there are various actions underway to determine what can and should be done on this issue, including:

· Provincial Physician Recruitment Strategy. Announced in May, this strategy is being developed to help address issues related to the recruitment of doctors in Saskatchewan. Specific initiatives include: the creation of a physician recruitment agency; enhancing medical training to prepare graduates for practice in rural Saskatchewan; enhancing the physician application and licensure process; a Saskatchewan-based program to assess foreign trained physicians; fair and competitive compensation; and lifestyle and professional supports.

Commercial Programs New Commercial Lighting Program - SaskPower Eneraction is offering incentives for commercial customers to get premium efficient fluorescent T8 lighting at standard T8 lighting costs. "This is a great opportunity for businesses to upgrade their lighting, save money on their power bill and become more environmentally friendly," says Judy Dunitz, SaskPower Eneraction Commercial Lighting Program Leader.

Energy Performance Contracting -Since 2000, SaskPower Eneraction has worked with Honeywell to help large Saskatchewan commercial and institutional customers improve the energy efficiency of their facilities. To-date,

the EPC program has completed 17 projects, renovated over 130 buildings and saved over \$18 million.

Commercial Geothermal - This program offers rebates to business and farm customers who install a geothermal system in a newly constructed building or retrofit and existing building (excluding residential dwellings).

All businesses that qualify will receive a 15 per cent rebate on the eligible cost of a geothermal system to a maximum rebate of \$100,000. Any existing buildings currently heated by natural gas are not eligible for the rebate.

Coming soon Later this year SaskPower Eneraction expects to launch the Municipal Ice Rink Program. This program will help municipalities improve the energy efficiency of their rink facilities and improve their operating practices so that they can better manage their power bills. In late 2009, we plan to launch a Demand response program focusing on the SaskPower's largest customers. Demand Response (DR) programs provide incentives to encourage consumers to reduce demand at peak times.
